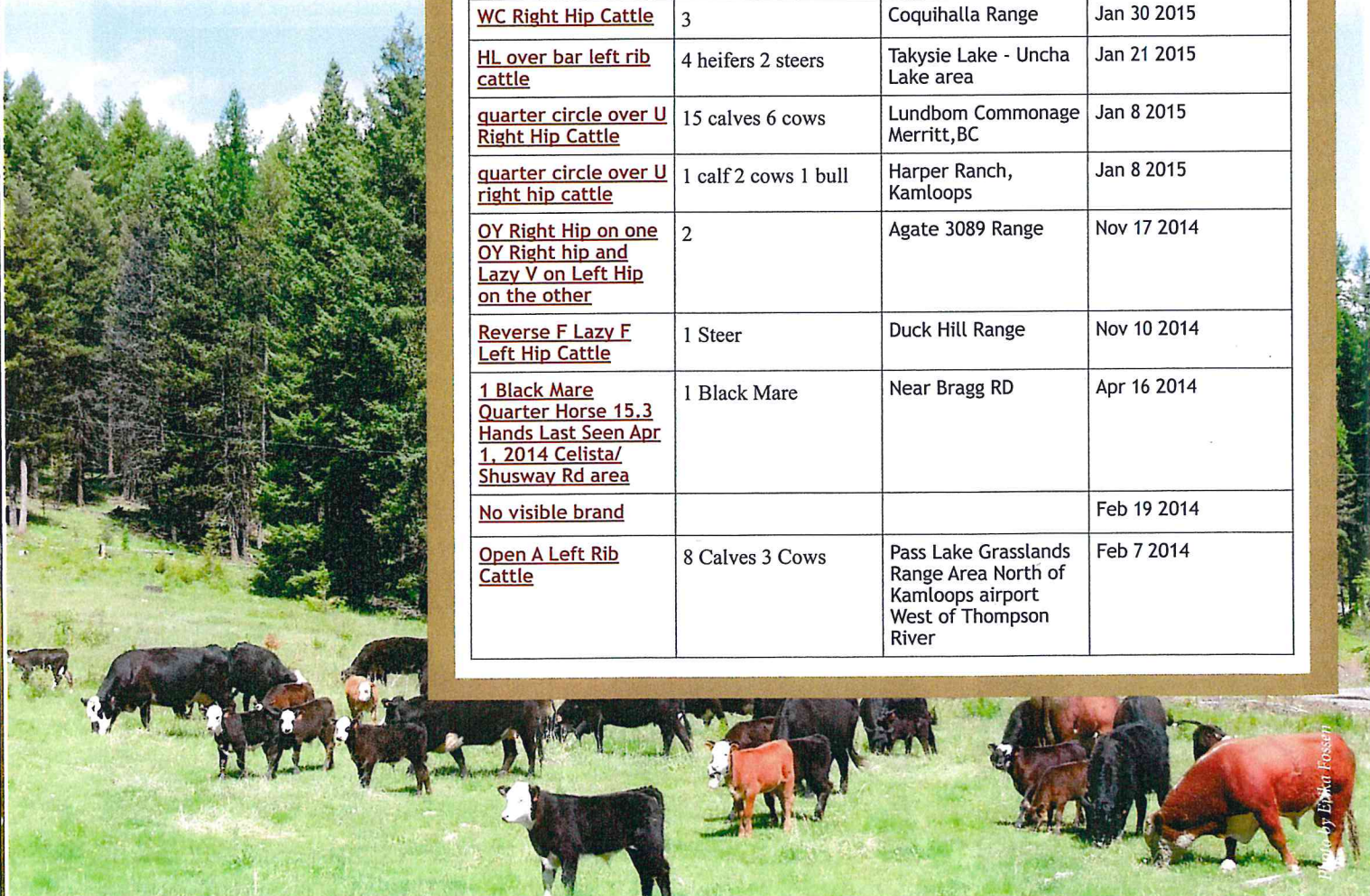
Ownership Identification Inc. (OII) encourages livestock producers to report missing livestock for immediate posting on their Active Missing Livestock file on the OII website [www.ownershipid.ca](http://www.ownershipid.ca). It is

easy to report missing livestock by:

- contacting their local brand inspector,
- contacting the OII office, or
- following the prompts to report missing livestock on the OII website.

Upon receiving a report of missing livestock, the OII office registers the information provided on their web page. Unless the livestock are reported found, OII will keep the information on the webpage for one year. In addition to the webpage, OII provides a hard copy of the report to area brand inspectors, all sale outlet facilities, the RCMP Livestock Coordinator, as well as to our brand inspection counterpart in Alberta – LIS. Approximately twice a year, B.C., Alberta and Saskatchewan brand office General Manager's and RCMP Stock Section personnel participate in a conference call to discuss, among other points of interest, missing livestock and potential pattern areas or persons flagged as high risk candidates regarding suspicion of theft or mysteriously missing livestock (Horses or Cattle).

The missing livestock information represents only what is reported by producers and livestock owners. Over the last several years, the numbers of reported missing animals has been similar. One change that has been noticed is a considerable increase in cattle brand registrations during the past twelve months. OII suspects this is a direct reflection of today's cattle market values.

### ABOUT OII

OII is a non-profit organization designated by the Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Fisheries in 1997 to administer the livestock brand registration and inspection program in British Columbia. The company is owned by shareholder groups; BC Cattlemen's Association, BC Breeders and Feeders Association, BC Association of Cattle Feeders, Horse Council BC and Mountain Livestock Markets Association. The company is run by a board of directors and managed out of their head office in Kamloops. BCCA has two representatives on the board: Mark Grafton and Agnes Jackson.

OII is responsible for the livestock brands registry and inspection services of cattle and horses for rightful possession prior to transportation, sale and slaughter. OII operates under the guidelines of the Livestock Identification Act and Livestock Identification Regulations of BC Reg 4/2010.

Currently, there are 32 part-time brand inspectors strategically located throughout the province. The program is financed in its entirety through the brand registration and inspection fees paid by livestock industry participants.
